





- RECONNECT if they've dropped out/stopped out



Workshop A: Empowering Students in the High School Selection Process

Core themes:

 Easier access to information for students, families, school personnel, and community partners

 School selection process should be a partnership with students, parents/families and schools – student/family empowerment

Enrollment process is difficult to navigate

Opportunities/next steps:

- Centralized location of information and resources sharing of school narrative for all stakeholders
- All stakeholders should be working together to inform and support students/families (Schools, OSSE, PCSB, DCPS) – student/family friendly process/timeline
- İdentify current resources & provide support where needed, i.e. MS/HS schools and community partners

Workshop B: Rethinking How Secondary Schools Engage Families

Core themes:

- Check biases and assumptions; align with reality
- Not all families are the same (need for differentiation)
- Think asset-based, not deficit-based

Opportunities/next steps:

- Clear, concise, informative, and actionable communications with a two-generational approach (parent & student input)
- More learning activities for relationship building (school -> family; family -> family, etc.)
- Collaborate and use resources that work (asset mapping)

Workshop C: Disrupting Unjust Systems by Confronting Our Own Mental Models

Core themes:

- How do we create spaces to learn and continue conversations around race and equity outside of trainings/summits?
- How do we ensure these conversations include staff, students, communities, and not not simply circles of homogeneity?
- How can we use data to challenge assumptions and reflect on our behavior about race and equity?
- How do we balance teaching "life lessons" (reality of race & equity) with kids and simultaneously seek to disrupt the system?

Opportunities/next steps:

- Become more knowledgeable about equity and related data; explore the why
- Gather activities and tools to facilitate this conversation beyond this session
- Network with like-minded educators to gather ideas and resources; build a coalition
